**Engagingaging**

10 January – 10 February 2011

From 10 January 2011 The Building Centre will be playing host to an exciting series of events including a workshop and an exhibition centred on the theme of ageing and identity. The work represents an international collaboration between Sheffield Hallam University in the UK and Cheng Chung University in Taiwan and forms part of a much larger research project exploring the experiences of people growing older in Taiwan with those of individuals in the UK.

A collection of artefacts, *ENGAGINGAGING*, designed by Paul Chamberlain (Sheffield Hallam) that aim to raise awareness and prompt reflection on issues of ageing will be on display. Inviting participants and people viewing the exhibition will be invited to explore a range of issues in relation to this broader theme including ageing, identity, the meaning of objects, place and space.

The exhibition is currently on show at the Museum of Contemporary Art (MCCA) Studio in Taipei until 10 December 2010, where it has received a considerable amount of attention.
