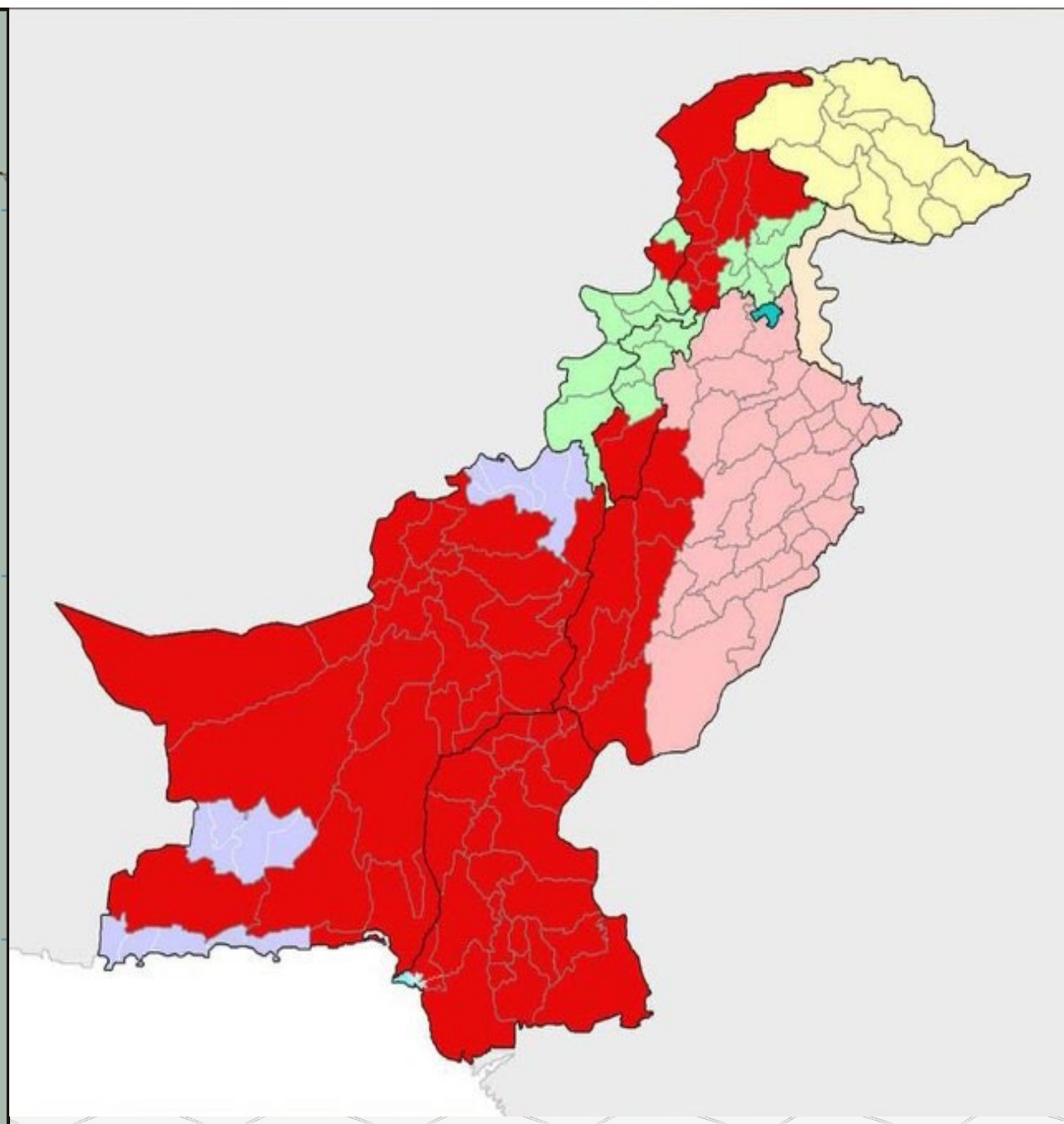

- . Pakistan has witnessed 21, including the current major floods in 75 years if its inception (1).
- . Floods in 1950, 1992 & 2010 has been the deadliest.
- . The 2022 floods have surpassed all the previous flood disasters.

2022 Floods

- 33 million people affected by the floods - 1 in 7 of the population.
- More than 1,500 people have been killed & more than 13,00 injured.
- 1.7 million homes have been destroyed or badly damaged.
- 900 health facilities across the country have been damaged.
- 3.6 million acres of crops have been affected, and 900,000 livestock lost.
